

The Medical School

Dear Reader....

You are now part of one of the most prestigious medical schools in the world, renowned for producing the best doctors and scientists, enriched with a deep history of medical breakthroughs in both clinical research and medical practice; a legacy which is carried on from its constituent medical schools.

in search of work in new factories. In 1822, the hospital decided to start training the likes of you and me, and thus CX med students were born.

The hospital was well patronised and stood in Charing Cross (on Agar Street in West Strand), where it continued to expand in size. By the end of the Second World War, the hospital needed to grow again, and there were discussions about moving patients to a different location, either to Mount Vernon or Northwick Park. Then finally in 1957, it was decided that CX Hospital was to be rebuilt in the place we know and love; Fulham Palace



Road (FPR). The bospital elders elected to retain the name Charing Cross, despite now being a distance from this area, an interesting decision that continues to have ramifications decades later, as freshers turn up at the Strand expecting to find a medical school there. Getting lost appears to be something of a feature of CX students, as one of their most notable alumni, Dr Livingstone, of "...I presume" fame, went missing in Africa for five years.



Flashback to 1719.... 4 men walk into a coffee house to discuss a 'charitable proposal for relieving the sick and needy and other distressed persons'. And thus, Westminster Hospital was formed. The medical school was

founded in 1834 by George Gutbrie, an ex-military surgeon. The emblem of this new medical school would be the Portcullis or Crown of Westminster. The ever-expanding hospital led to conflict amongst staff, and Guthire's insistence on retaining the location of the hospital and school ended in a pistol duel between two surgeons, who steady-as-a-rock, promptly missed each other (#donoharm). The winning majority remained in central London, but the losers went to St. George's Hospital (some things never change). In 1984, in a move that no doubt brought out the pistols again, the medical school merged with its rival Charing Cross.







The two medical schools combined their resources for a joint slay and together, focused their rivalry on their old enemy, St. Mary's.

Hang on a second...

Sy Mary's Hospiyal Medical School

St Mary's Hospital Medical School is the youngest of the three schools, founded in 1854 as part of the new hospital situated in Paddington. The emblem of St Mary's was the Fleur-de-Lys and you can still see graduates of St Mary's walking a round proudly with their Fleur-de-Lys ties to this day!



Unlike CX and Westminster, Mary's remained unmoved in its location and still stands tall and proud in Paddington today. Mary's was traditionally the refuge of sons of Welsh farmers and miners, stumbling off the train at Paddington to study medicine; consequently, it became renowned for its prowess on the rugby field with the club predating the Rugby Football Union (one of the most famous alumni being the late great JPR Williams)! Mary's has an equally rich bistory in the arts with the dramatic society staged performances of operettas at Wilson House (now one of the student accommodations) which on occasion were graced with a royal visit. This royal association continued with the Queen Mother being the patron of the Soirée, the opera and drama comedy night, until her death in 2002 (these shows are now honoured by the "Main Show" and "24" productions by ICSM Light Opera Society).

Mary's is not only the birthplace of the Royal babies but also the birthplace of Penicillin. St Mary's is renowned for the work of Sir Alexander Fleming (Mr SAF bimself), the father of antibiotics, following his discovery of penicillin at the bospital in 1928. The room in which the discovery took place can be seen from the road outside the medical school.

But how does it all come together?

IMPERIAL COLLEGE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE

In 1988, a little university called Imperial College London merged with St Mary's Hospital Medical School. Then in 1997, St Mary's merged with her biggest rival, Charring Cross and Westminster Medical School. And like a Phoenix rising from the ashes, the Imperial College School of Medicine, or ICSM, was born.

"Each constituent piece of Medical School history would be represented; the Fleur-de-Lys of St Mary's, The Maltese Cross of Charing Cross and the Portcullis or Crown of Westminster. And the piece de resistance for any of my designs was always going to be a symbol that would bring them all together. As a child, I The iconic ICSMSU Phoenix was designed by Dr Prash Patel (who was a medical student at the time).

loved the myths and culturally, reincarnation was always something to learn and understand. It is why, for me, there is no better illustration for rebirth than the myth of the Phoenix." - Dr Prash Patel BSc MBBS DRCOG MRCGP

The rich history and foundation of medicine at Imperial College resulted in it being one of the largest medical schools in Europe! Imperial has a world-class scientific reputation; With fourteen Nobel Prize winners, its own nuclear reactor and wind tunnel (facilities which are used by the top F1 teams, conducting cutting-edge research encompassing the National Heart and Lung Institute, and being at the forefront of pioneering the UK's response to COVID-19.

Academically, ICSM students are part of an institution that brought the world the valuable field of public health medicine, and spearheaded the attack on infectious disease, saving, quite literally, millions of lives. You will be taught by, and work alongside, the foremost research groups in the world. The academic capital that Imperial holds is a resource that will give you an education like no other.

Socially, you'll be a part of traditions stretching back three centuries, in a vibrant college with the best students studying medicine in the world. As you read earlier, Imperial proudly had the likes of JPR Williams, Sir Alexander Fleming, H.G. Wells, and Brian May as its students. Everywhere you go from now on, when people see you are from Imperial College School of Medicine, they'll know they're dealing with someone special. Be proud of it.

I bope you have a spectacular time at ICSM and an amazing Fresher's Fortnight.

OUR CAMPUSES

SOUTH KENSINGTON - SAF

The Sir Alexander Fleming building, or SAF, will be where you spend most of your lecture / teaching hours in 1st year.

Located on the left as you walk in from Exhibition Road, it houses 2 lecture theatres at the top of the stairs (though we're mostly inside G16), a few study rooms, and a computer room at the back of the building.

On the right side of the foyer, the Loud Bird is Imperial's alternative to a Nando's meal (for about half the price!) - fair warning, the queue can get pretty long come lunchtime.

You can find the ICSMSU common room just past Loud Bird, with couches, microwaves, and the SU President's office. There are also lockers available to students (contact the Sites and Services officer for more info), plus a decent amount of comfy seating around.

Travel-wise, it's about an 8-minute walk from South Kensington, the closest tube station.

South Kensington - Other:



Whilst SAF's lab spaces undergo renovation, you'll be using the Royal College of Science building's labs for larger group teaching (The RCS building can be found to the left of SAF's entrance)

Otherwise, if you're looking for study spaces, the Abdus Salam Central Library can be found across Queen's Lawn from SAF. It has 4 floors of seating - a (busy!) group study area on the ground floor, plus silent and quiet study areas on the upper floors. You can find tons of computers and borrow books on all subjects, plus there's a lovely café below! Go-Study areas are also available on the upper floors of the Sir Ernst Chain building, to the right of SAF.



CHARING CROSS HOSPITAL

Firstly, despite the name, Charing Cross Hospital is nowhere near Charing Cross station! The hospital was relocated in the 1970s and has been in Hammersmith ever since. Many students move over to the area for later years, for closer proximity to placements and teaching.

The Reynolds' building hosts the Brian Drewe lecture theatre - the largest ICSM has! Recently refurbished, Reynolds' bar can be found on the ground floor. A canteen by day, bar by night - it has hosted staple ICSM events for years, including Sports' Night on Wednesdays, as well as the infamous Reynolds' Show every Freshers' Fortnight! Otherwise, you can find the Charing Cross library on the 2nd floor and a gym in the basement (handy for anyone living near Hammersmith!).

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In terms of teaching, lockers and classrooms can be found on the 7th floor of the Lab Block building (follow the path to the right from Reynolds' front entrance), whilst the Anatomy Lab (with all its cadavers) is on the 14th floor and Clinical Skills labs on the 13th floor.

For travel, the fastest way is walking through Margravine Cemetery from Barons Court station, or walking down Fulham Palace Road from Hammersmith station. A tip to avoid being massively late to Anatomy – the elevators can take centuries to get up to the 7th and 14th floors, so make sure to get there 15–20 minutes early. Or if you're like me and want a free cardio workout, you can also climb the stairs 14 floors up!

Sy Mary's Hospital

Besides placements, Mary's still comes in handy as a secondary study space, especially if you're staying in Wilson House! The library, whilst smaller than others, hosts a decent number of desks, and if you want to work out or relax after a long day of revision, the gym and common room are just downstairs!

> Not much centralised teaching goes on at St Mary's campus anymore, but it's still one of our main hospital placement sites, with students being able to watch some of the most complex surgeries, due to it being a Major Trauma Centre.

Hammersmith Hospital.

This isn't a place you'll be spending much time in earlier years and is mainly reserved for iBSc students and the occasional hospital placement. Located just next to Wormwood Scrubs in East Acton, the Commonwealth Building bosts its library, lockers, as well as the Wolfson restaurant (which is pretty nice as bospital canteens go...).

ST MARY

CHELSEA AND WESTMINSTER HOSPITAL

OSPINAT

This is bonestly the fanciest-built hospital ICSM has to offer! The foyer alone will blow you away, with its tank of tropical fish and sunlight filling all 5 floors. It boasts some of the most modern architecture in any hospital, along with proximity to numerous eateries (B Bagel and Buns from Home being some personal notable entries), as well as a cinema for patients (which unfortunately is not considered an 'essential' activity for your placements...).

YOUR COURSE: MBBS BSC

Hello freshers! I'm Onali, the Academic Editor for the Gazette for 2024-25, and I'm here to give you an overview of the MBBS/BSc course. My aim isn't to go through every single detail - it's to dissect (2011) the info you'll get about academics this year, I'll throw in some tips from a 4th-year's heart on how to deal with your years here. We're here to help!

You got through the interview, passed your A-levels, and now you're here.

First year is genuinely a really exciting time. The other articles in this guide are proof of that. But it can also be quite intimidating.

Some things you'll get used to right away, but often you'll find yourself changing how you do things <u>multiple times</u> to find what suits you. I encourage you to let yourself settle in gradually, because there is always time. Especially in a 6-year medical degree **Q**

Here are the modules, and some tips ;)

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Instead of year groups, we have <u>Phases</u>.

<u>PHASE I</u> is years 1 (Ia), 2 (Ib) and 3 (Ic), where you get a mixed theoretical and practical foundation for becoming a doctor.

<u>PHASE 2</u> is year 4, your intercalated BSc year.



<u>PHASE 3</u> is years 5 (3a) and 6 (3B), where you gear up for the MLA (the final, final exam) and build on those academic and clinical foundations from earlier years.

<u> Vear 1: Into the deep end</u>

MODULES IN YEAR ONE:

TERM 1:

PRINCIPLES OF MEDICINE-

Essentially biochemistry, usually split into Cell biology, Immunology, Haematology, and Genetics. This can be a lot at once, so pay attention to the Tips later. <u>Note that you do</u> <u>NOT need to memorise the 'primer' you are given before you start</u> - it might be referenced very occasionally, but need-to-know things will be reiterated (There is an exam on this module at the end of the year)!

Remember to <u>DRINK WATER</u> <u>AND EAT</u> <u>BREAKFAST</u> <u>BEFORE YOUR</u> <u>PROSECTIONS</u> if you want to avoid dizziness and suffering.

TERM 2: BIOREGULATORY SYSTEMS - Just like your A-level buman biology. This involves lectures on different specialities and organs. BRS also involves Anatomy study; that's your prosections, clinical exam skills, and radiology. There is a BRS exam and a separate Anatomy exam at the end of the year)



The pre-reading for Anatomy can be a LOT. My advice is to learn the basics from OTHER resources first, and then skim through the pre-reading afterwards for extra detail if you like. The TeachMeAnatomy website and the Complete Anatomy app (in particular, the labelled "models" that follow one nerve/one artery, etc.) can be amazing. The questions at the back of the dissection pdfs are VERY relevant to the exam so pay real attention to those.

Many people have made fantastic flashcards based on images that may come up in the actual exam - something to potentially ask an older year about ...

THROUGHOUT THE YEAR: CLINICAL AND SCIENTIFIC INTEGRATION -

You go through cases, just like a clinical team would, in "small groups" that you stay with until Year 3. Throughout the year, you will be examined on each case as an individual, then as a team with the SAME multiple-choice questions as the individual test. You will also have a group task during these assessments. It is very relevant to how cases will be in the hospital, and what knowledge is a must on placement, which makes it one of my favourite modules (Older Years' notes are ESPECIALLY valuable here, particularly MedEd in a pinch!). These exams are pass/fail.

Term 3:

After exams, you go straight into 2 weeks of placement at hospital (finally!), a chance to learn about working in hospital and gain exposure to the realities of different specialties. Look out for <u>a future blog post</u> <u>with "Tips for Placement" later in the year!</u>

<u>PATIENTS, COMMUNITIES AND</u> <u>HEALTHCARE -</u>

This is what your GP and primary care placements tie into. During the year, you will be placed with a partner at a GP surgery, where you learn about primary care and organise a Community Survey Project across Autumn/Spring term to help gather data within the surgery. My advice is to decide on your project EARLY, so you can distribute your survey/resources straight after Christmas. This module is pass/fail.

LIFESTYLE MEDICINE AND <u>PREVENTION</u>-

This is the geography side of Medicine. You will have sessions throughout the year about the social, environmental and institutional factors that can affect health outside of clinic.

After exams and placement, you will be randomly allocated groups to produce an "<u>LMAP Podcast</u>" using your knowledge and specific sessions. The potential topics of your podcast are split into: sleep, physical activity, nutrition, mental health, and health + wealth, which is allocated as closely as possible according to preference. This module is pass/fail.

PEAR 2: INTO THE DEED END (AGAIN)



A notable difference between Years 1 and 2 is demand - more lectures and more content, despite the fact there is no POM to think about! It mostly BUILDS on previous content, repeats key knowledge and overall the study tips above relate a lot to second year as well. BRS is spread across the year, and unlike Year 1 there is an end-of-year OPEN-BOOK LMAP exam based on Year 1 and 2 content.

Y ou also have the **CRI** (Clinical Research and Innovation) project to look forward to after exams – where you use your accumulated research skills to create a Research poster with a team. In previous years you got to rank your preferred topic, and they will allocate groups taking your choices into account. In previous years, the projects have been in Applied Clinical, Healthcare Technology, Laboratory Research and Medical Education, but this is subject to change. You can apply as a group or an individual, and there is even a chance to do a Residential project.



PEAR 3: A TASTE OF CLINICAL! (AND EVERPONE ELSE IS GRADUATING)

This year is your first full-on placement year. That's 24 weeks of placement across the year split into 8-week segments in different specialties, with consolidation lecture weeks in each gap. And, of course, it's the year where you start to really get a handle on how to interact with others in a hospital setting, scrub up for surgery, and clinical skills like taking blood and setting up IV drips - exciting stuff! You only have 2 exams for this year - the "Written" exam (based on the list of conditions given at the star of the year), and the famous OSCEs (Clinical Practice exams) for which you can get tutoring just like for previous years.

You don't get an Easter (just 1 week of revision before your exams ⁽²⁾) but it is great preparation for what studying as a doctor will be like in future. Seems intimidating, I know, but you will get used to a different way of studying where Passmed/Quesmed question banks and flashcards start to be used pretty much ubiquitously. Look out for the Gazette's upcoming Winter edition for an article on the strengths and weaknesses of various online medical education resources ⁽²⁾ _ THE FRESHER'S HANDBOOK 2024 ___

PEAR 4: Cosplap as a normal degree

Welcome to BSc year! At Imperial, you have a LOT of choice, but you only have to decide March-ish of Year 3, when things have probably changed. However, if you want a sneak peek the Gazette will be releasing their iBSc guide later in the year with student perspectives - Watch this space!

Pears 5 and G: Final Stretch! (or, The Timetable without the Income)

This is far off yet, but the main thing is that you jump back into clinical stuff and placement. It's a very different trajectory - 5th Year is July to June with 4 weeks holiday total across the year (just like a real job ↔). In 6th Year, you start in late July, have final exams in February. After this, you go through electives (that you organise yourself) and pre-foundation experience before you graduate.

The one thing to take from this section is be prepared for a drastic change in finances, especially if you are living out. Your SFE decreases drastically in 5th and 6th year, so start saving! Look up the Imperial Bursary EARLY to help you out with this, probably available to a lot of you but especially if you are means-tested for SFE this year.

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General Academic Advice

<u>PLEASE use other people's</u> <u>notes.</u> You do not need to memorise every fact on every slide (ESPECIALLY for POM), and other people's notes point this out!

- DO NOT stress if you don't know the content to the same degree as you did for A-levels, even after your first exams. The course is 6 years; information will reappear over and over in different contexts.
- At least understanding around 60-70% of the content in first-year is very well-done.
- Older years have done your exams and know how to prioritise, so use them!

Join MedEd chats, Muslim Medics and other ICSM societies (don't overlook the ICSM Arts societies, they run a tight ship!) for their notes and tutoring. Take a good look at the ICSMSU Notebank (a OneDrive of loads of older-year notes) Teams groups and tutorials should be knocking around your year-group chats if you need.

- When starting university most people DO NOT know how to study. This can be a difficult lesson (it definitely was for me) and requires a lot of trial and error, but don't let this intimidate you! It's still ongoing for me and I've still passed each year (plus had fun doing it!
 >)
- Your peers are your friends. So many people genuinely feel the same as you. Learn stuff in your own time and get through it - I promise everyone (including you) can be very very excellent at the same time!
- Try Mind Maps, Flashcards (Anki, Brainscape and Quizlet have different formats that suit different people) and FREE!!
- Going through cases can also be fantastic, which is why lectures are full of them!

CONCLUSION

That was a lot T-T Well done for getting this far, and don't worry if you didn't take everything in. I definitely didn't before Year 1 started, but it will start clicking as the year goes on. Return to this whenever, and bear in mind that those Year 1 tips I've listed are applicable for pretty much every year \bigcirc Good luck, and feel free to email me (<u>op421@ic.ac.uk</u>) with any questions or a chat!

<u>BSC MEDICAL BIOSCIENCES (BMB)</u>

So you're finally bere at uni! You start your uni life with a bang at freshers. Whether it's going to all the events and socials, joining the tons of clubs and societies, or finding that group of friends to chill with, you design your freshers!

It might seem that you're surrounded by a sea of medics during freshers – but this is just because of sheer numbers! Look out for fellow BMB freshers, join the Year WhatsApp chat, or find the BMB President, Academic Officer, and Welfare Officer during freshers!

This section is full of stuff ICSMSU and BMBSoc are doing for freshers, but here are some of our top tips:

- Enjoy freshers and make full use of the events
- Be open minded to trying new activities and sports since you can meet lots of great people through these CSPs!
- Engage with the Union and BMBSoc as much as you can as it helps put your name out there, and allows you understand the structure of the course and Union

- I promise you will make friends even if you do not live in student halls or accommodation. It can feel scary at first, but everyone at Uni is also in the same situation as you (they want to make friends).

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STATISTICS (STAT)

Assignments and exams: Summative Exam: 50% In-course-assessment (JCA): 50%

Téaching method: eModules, Face-to-face sessions, consolidation tasks, office hours.

Learn how to explore data sets and undertake rigorous statistical analysis. You will learn basic statistical concepts and then apply them in a scientific context by using R and working with datasets. Anticipate a bit of coding – but don't worry, they start from the basics!

Our Top Tips:

- Have a code glossary & definition glossary: whenever you come across a new piece of code & definition, you'll have somewhere to put it.
- Prioritise the coding sessions! Learning the code is important but it's much more significant to put it into use.
- Practice makes perfect: You'll bave plenty of opportunities to tackle analysis and application questions throughout the module, make good use of these, especially in face-to-face sessions.

Autumn Term: October Winter Term: January - March Summer Term: April- June

MOLECULAR AND CELLULAR BIOLOGY (MCB)

Assignments and exams: Summative Exam: 50% In-course-assessment (JCA): 50%

Teaching method: eModules, Tace-to-face sessions, consolidation tasks, office hours.

Gain a thorough understanding of molecular biology and cellular biology in order to comprehend the impact of these disciplines on human health. You will learn the fundamentals of human biology from genes, to cell, to system – this is the largest module of the year, so keep at it!

Our Top Tips:

- Before coming into the face-toface sessions, make sure you have a firm grasp of the key, significant aspects of each process & mechanism
- Writing out processes step-bystep, with numbered steps will be helpful in the exams and make it a lot more clear to learn
- Go over the TBL sessions, focusing on the questions as it is helpful practise for the exam
- Focus on the general understanding of mechanisms and number of proteins in each step.

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CHEMISTRY OF BIOLOGICAL INTERACTIONS (CBI)

ASSIGNMENTS AND EXAMS: SUMMATIVE EXAM: 50% In-course-assessment (JCA): 50%

TEACHING METHOD: EMODULES, TACE-TO-FACE SESSIONS, CONSOLIDATION TASKS, OFFICE HOURS.

Investigate the role that chemicals and macromolecules play at the cellular, molecular, and system levels, using examples to illustrate their real-world implications. While these delve into chemistry topics, don't worry if you haven't done chemistry at school – they start from the basics!

<u>Our Top Tips:</u>

- Practice the exam papers, and application of concepts is key to succeed in this module!
- Have a glossary for equations & any concepts that could be applied to different molecules, for example rules & graphs
- CBI content is much more conceptual than MCB, so you must take the time to thoroughly understand each topic.

INTEGRATIVE BODY Systems (INTS)

Assignments and exams: Summative Exam: 50% In-course-assessment (JCA): 50%

Téaching method: eModules, Face-to-face sessions, consolidation tasks, office hours.

Learn how the nervous system controls and regulates the functioning of the body, the fundamentals of the musculoskeletal system, the basics of the hematology and endocrinology.

Our Top Tips:

- You might think contentheavy modules like INTS are focused on rote memorisation, but there's a surprising amount of analysis and application too! Make sure that you build a solid foundation of knowledge through effective revision.
- Don't only revise the parts you like in INST, as they're all weighted equally in the exam
- Prioritise prereading before every session and have a good understanding of it as the topics change quickly.

LAB POD 1 (LP1)

ASSIGNMENTS AND EXAMS: PRACTICAL & XAM: 33% SAB & OOK: 33% ORAL PRESENTATION: 33%

TEACHING METHOD: EMODULES, LAB MEETINGS, LAB SESSIONS, FACE-TO-FACE SESSIONS.

Explore real scientific questions in a supportive, yet challenging environment, modelled after an active research lab, and experience the excitement of performing scientific research. <u>Our Top Tips:</u>

- LP1 is centred on knowledge from MCB; life in the second balf of year one will be much easier if you can properly revise MCB content.
- Teamwork, communication and preparedness are the three essential skills during LP1! As your team gains more autonomy in the second half of the module, make sure you are aware of your part in the team.
- Understanding the theory and why certain practices are set in place will make your lab days & exams a lot easier
- The lab book might seem tedious and long, however, it is crucial to fill it out properly to save you time in the future

OUR COD (IDS FOR PEAR 1

Complied By MAELLE 42 & BMBSOC

- Don't do the modules the night before the Face-to-face session. Allow yourself at least a week before to fully understand the material and not just memorise it.
- Engage as much as you can with the content and the teaching fellows in the F2F, since the exams are similar(-ish) to the F2F scenarios& case studies.
- Although they seem easy(-ish), don't do the eModules in one go and instead give yourself breaks in between because some can be very long and tiring.

- In the F2F, make sure you pay attention to what's happening instead of just taking notes. F2F sessions are not lectures, and are meant to be interactive!
- Enjoy the flexibility you have with BMB and the pre-session material!

Each modules consists of 3 materials:

- Pre-session: e-module, this is where you pre-read the materials to be prepared for the on-site lectures.
- 2. Face-to-face: this is where the contents used for on-site lectures are eg tasks, exercises.
- 3. Consolidation: this is where after class, extra exercises are uploaded, however based on statistics, the number of people doing them gradually decreases



Academic Support

(REPS, DOING SURVEYS, SU OFFICERS, AI AND PLAGIARISM SUPPORT)

At Imperial, every course will have Academic and Welfare Representatives of each cohort/year, so for BMB, you'll have the chance to either run for those two Academic Rep or one Welfare Rep position, or vote for your peers!

As an Academic Representative your main task is to represent your cohort in all things and matters academic and improve the academic experience of all your peers. You'll be trained by the Faculty and every term your main task is to receive feedback from your year on each Module, exams, in-course assessments and relay these concerns and issues to the Staff via Student-Staff Liaison Group (SSLG) meetings. Don't worry though, you'll have my guidance (the Academic Officer).



<u>General Advice!</u>



- Although they say, don't use CharGPT, this AI can be very helpful: when you don't understand stg don't leave it there, ask AI to explain it to you. Never leave a question unanswered because you won't understand the content.
- At the beginning of the year, I took notes by hand, but then I realised it's very time-consuming so I switched to a laptop. Typing is faster and easier when it comes to organising your notes. One Note and Word are 2 examples of great apps that can be used for notetaking. Remember, decorating your notes won't help you to understand the material better, indeed, it slows you down.
- As the exams (except for stat) are open-book, it's easier to use a platform where you can easily find your notes within a topic.
- Don't assume that just because stg is formative it's unnecessary, don't rush and leave formative assignments for the last minute! This is because formative assignments are marked by the TFs who give feedback about your work. Their suggestions and advice help you to improve which you can implement into your summative ICA and exam.
- Always have questions and never go to a session without thinking you already know everything: someone who knows everything actually knows nothing. This is because after each session you can talk to lecturers directly who'll gladly answer your questions. Furthermore, there are arranged drop in sessions. I made the mistake of not coming to those sessions thus when I struggled with something I had to deal with it on my own

INTERNSHIPS/UROPS/ACADEMIC Opportunities

Hi, I'm Adri! During the summer after my second year, I was fortunate enough to secure two internships: one UROP at Imperial and another research experience outside of Imperial. The application process for both was quite similar, and I'd like to share some tips that might help.

First, I did some research into the topics that interested me. I then reached out to professors involved in that field via email. In these emails, I introduced myself, stated what I was studying, and explained my interests. I highlighted what I found intriguing about their research, referencing specific papers or publications. I expressed my interest in gaining research experience and suggested meeting for coffee to discuss potential opportunities or simply to learn more about their work.

Fortunately, both professors responded positively. We met for coffee, had insightful discussions, and I was able to secure the internships. To prepare for these meetings, I made a list of questions about their research to show that I had done my homework and was genuinely interested.

The paperwork for the internships was straightforward, mostly involving filling out an application form, which was a formality that required the professor's approval. Unfortunately, my UROPs were not funded because I applied late for the Imperial one, and the external research program primarily catered to PhD students. However, they made an exception for me, which was very lucky!

Even without funding, the experiences were incredibly enriching. If you're aiming for a funded UROP, it's best to start the application process early. These internships have provided me with invaluable experience for my third-year placement and have equipped me with great skills for my CV and my master's applications!

I hope this helps, and I wish you the best of luck in securing your own internships!

This year's Welfare team is made up of Kete (Chair), Iolanthe (Vice Chair), Senara (Vice Chair) and Brian (Vice Chair for BMB).

They work as part of the ICSMSU, with Faculty and other student support and representation structures within the College, to improve the wellbeing provisions across campus and support individuals who are facing challenges and dealing with hardship whilst at ICSM. They are an approachable, friendly bunch so don't be afraid to say hi during Fresher's fortnight. They are very excited to meet you and to welcome you into the ICSM community!

Studies

First year is all about striking a balance between working hard and playing bard. You have a lot more time and flexibility, but with it comes the responsibility to use it wisely. Get as involved as you can in clubs and societies, as these will support you throughout the next six years - forging friendships and fostering interests.

First year can be challenging, all the new people and the learning approach is very different. However, don't feel afraid to ask your academic officer or any older years for help if you become stuck – we've all been there before, and we will always be more than happy to pass on our hints, tips and useful resources. Just know that at ICSM you are never alone. Look out for study sessions and study groups throughout the year to get the best advice from older years about how to juggle your studies and your socials and tonnes of advice on your content throughout the year.

Finances

For many of you, coming to university can be challenging as it may be the first time that you are financially responsible, and keeping track of your spending is often easier said than done. Support is always available for you if you end up out of your depth, so please ask as soon as you feel like you may need some help! There are lots of options available, so speak to us and we can make sure that you receive the right support for your situation. The most important thing is to speak up if you are struggling.

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SAFETY

London is a big city and it is important that you stay safe. Make sure that you are street savvy, don't flash expensive items around or leave bags open or unattended. On nights out, use common sense by travelling in groups and NEVER use an unlicensed taxi to get home, no matter how loudly your bed is calling to you! Remember to register with a London GP as soon as you can, as this is often something which gets passed over in all the excitement of freshers (when freshers flu hits it's probably easier is your GP is close by.) With regards to sexual health, stay consensual and stay safe. Don't forget to look after yourself.

ALCOHOL

Alcobol is one of the main things which can throw freshers off in the first few weeks. You don't have to drink to have fun or make friends - lot's of people don't drink and still have crazy cool experiences. For those of you who do drink, learning your limits can be a sharp learning curve and something which should be done at your own pace. You should never feel pressured to drink, and if you are placed into a situation which makes you feel uncomfortable then please find one of the Welfare team or another member of the SU. Whether you drink or not, look out for one another!

WHERE CAN I GO TO FOR HELP?

We are very lucky within ICSM to have a brilliant network of people you can approach. Within your first two weeks you will meet your personal tutor who is there to support and advise you throughout your time in medical school. Remember to sign up for Mum's & Dad's, where you will be invited into the "families" of older years who will make sure that you are ready and supported throughout the upcoming weeks.

If in doubt just get in touch with anyone on the Welfare stream, on SU or FEO Welfare and someone will direct you where to go.

Congratulations on making it to ICSM! Well done and a warm welcome to Imperial. This year, Imperial is ranked the best university in Europe, so you've done a sensational job, and you are thoroughly deserving of your place here. Everyone is hiding some insecurities, so don't be threatened by peacocks. You've not got time for imposter syndrome. Imperial chose YOU.

It's going to be hard but it's also going to be great. Invest the time in nurturing friendships that will help you through the tough times and party with you in the good ones. Also important to remember, just because you have a medical degree doesn't mean you have to be a doctor.
